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## 9th grade math worksheets printable with answers

Word problems can be challenging for students, especially second grader students, who could still learn to read. But, you can use basic strategies that almost any student will work with, even those who are just starting to learn written language skills. To help second grad class students solve word problems, teach them to use the following steps: Survey the math problem: Read the word problem to get an idea of your normal nature. Talk with your students about the problem and discuss which parts are most important. Read the math problem: Read the question again. This time, focus on the specific details of the problem. Which parts of the problem relate to each other? Ask questions about the campaigns involved: Reflect again. Determine specific math operations the problem is asking you to perform, and list them on paper in the order they have to be done. Question yourself about the steps you've taken: Review every step you've taken. Determine whether your answer seems appropriate or not. If possible, check your answer against the answers to the book to determine if you are on the right track. Wrap it up: Scan through the text of word problems that you will solve to identify any word you don't recognize. List them and set their meanings before solving the problems. Write brief definitions of words for your reference while solving the problem. After reviewing these strategies, use the following free word-problem printables to practice what students have learned. There are only three worksheets because you don't want to overwhelm your second grader when they're just learning to do word problems. Start slowly, review the steps if necessary, and give your young learners the chance to absorb information and learn word problem-solving techniques at a relaxed pace. Printables contain words with which young students will be familiar, such as triangles, squares, ladders, dimes, nickels, and weekdays. Dee Russell includes this printable eight math word problems that will seem quite wordy for second grade, but actually quite simple. Problems on this worksheet include word phrases such as word problems, such as: On Wednesday you saw 12 robins on a tree and 7 on another tree. How many robins did you see completely? And all of your 8 friends have 2 wheel bicycles, how many wheels does that altogether? If students seem confused, read the problems aloud together with them. Explain that once you strip words, these are really simple extra and multiplication problems, where the answer to the first will be: 12 Robins + 7 Robins = 19 Robins; While the other will respond: 8 dudes x 2 wheels (for each bike) = 16 wheels. Dee Russell On this printable, students will work after four increasing difficulty after six questions starting with two easy problems. Some questions include: How many sides are on the four triangles? And a man Was carrying, but the wind blew 12 away. He has 17 balloons How many did he start? If students need help, explain that the answer to the first will be: 4 triangles x 3 sides (for each triangle) = 12 sides; While the other will respond: 17 balloons + 12 balloons (which were blown away) = 29 balloons. This final printable bit in the D Russell set has a bit more difficult problems, such as that it involves a penny: You have 3 quarters and your pop costs you 54 cents. How much money do you have left? To answer this one, students have surveyed the problem, then read it together as a class. Ask questions such as: Can we help solve this problem? If students are unsure, grab three quarters and explain that they are equal to 75 cents. The problem then becomes a simple subtraction problem, so wrap it by setting the numbers on the board thus: 75 cents - 54 cents = 21 cents.
